
Marking Children's Mental Health Week

More than ever, we are all facing strains on our mental health – an often-invisible issue which is being compounded by the stresses of lockdown. To promote good mental health and help children deal with the stresses that face them, schools across the Trust have been marking Children's Mental health week with a range of activities designed to promote mindfulness and wellbeing.

At Lympsham, staff organised events for the children in and out of school including virtual PE sessions to get children active, screen free Friday to help children re-engage with live beyond screens, and story readings such as 'My Monster and Me' and 'The Colour Monster' which in age appropriate ways helped children to recognise when they might feel different emotions, why, and how to deal with them. All of the above prompted lots of great discussions with teachers and peers, helping to get the children engaged with their mental health and how to support themselves through challenging times.

Further to this, in order to continue to promote positive mental health the school have begun running 'Wellbeing-Wednesdays' on their social media accounts where the school is promoting resources and techniques to help children's wellbeing. More than ever we hope that this will protect and support our young people, and help them cope with the stresses of lockdown life.

followed by the telling of the Wassail story, a toasting of the tree with real toast and some West Croft Farm cider and then the final rendition of a traditional Wassail song." He adds: "The children really enjoyed learning about this ancient tradition and hopefully next year we can all return to West Croft Farm in Brent Knoll to celebrate in a real cider orchard."
